

Coming Boldly To The Throne Of Grace

This lesson explores Hebrews 4:14–16, where the inspired writer presents Jesus Christ as the believer’s compassionate and exalted High Priest. The passage shows that our confidence in approaching God is grounded in Christ’s perfect humanity, His sinlessness, His sympathy with our struggles, and His victorious position at the right hand of God. Because of who He is and what He has done, believers are invited to draw near boldly to the throne of grace, where mercy and help are freely given.

Introduction:

1. Hebrews 4:14–16 presents one of the most comforting invitations in all of Scripture, reminding believers that they may draw near to God with confidence because of Christ’s priestly work (**Hebrews 4:14–16**). The introduction emphasises that access to God is not based on personal merit but on the finished work of the High Priest who has passed into the heavens.
2. The inspired writer brings together the humanity and deity of Christ, showing that He sympathises with our weaknesses while remaining without sin (**Hebrews 4:15**). This combination gives believers both comfort and reverence as they approach God in prayer.
3. The passage highlights that help, mercy, and grace are available to believers in every season of need (**Hebrews 4:16**). The introduction prepares the way to examine why the throne of grace is a place of confidence rather than fear for those who trust in Christ.

1. Seeing Then That We Have A Great High Priest (Hebrews 4:14):

- a. Jesus is called “a great high priest” because His priesthood surpasses all others, for He has passed “into the heavens,” entering God’s presence on behalf of believers (**Hebrews 4:14**). His ascension demonstrates both the completion of His atoning work and His ongoing intercession for His people. Believers may therefore approach God confidently, knowing that their High Priest stands before the Father on their behalf.
- b. The writer identifies Him as “Jesus the Son of God,” uniting His humanity and deity in one person (**Hebrews 4:14**). As Jesus, He shares our human experience; as the Son of God, He exercises divine authority. This dual identity assures believers that He fully understands their condition, yet possesses all power to help them.
- c. The exhortation “let us hold fast our profession” calls believers to remain steadfast in faith (**Hebrews 4:14**). Since Christ remains faithful, believers are encouraged to persevere in their confession, trusting that their salvation is secure in Him.

2. For We Have Not An High Priest Which Cannot Be Touched (Hebrews 4:15):

- a. Christ is deeply moved by the struggles of His people, for He is “touched with the feeling of our infirmities” (**Hebrews 4:15**). His compassion is not distant or theoretical; He experienced human weakness, hunger, weariness, rejection, and sorrow. This sympathy assures believers that their High Priest understands their trials intimately.
- b. Though He was tempted in all points as we are, He remained without sin (**Hebrews 4:15**). This perfect sinlessness qualifies Him to represent humanity before God while remaining the spotless sacrifice. Because He overcame every temptation, believers may rely on His strength when facing their own.
- c. Christ’s sympathy encourages believers to come honestly before God, knowing that their struggles are neither dismissed nor ignored (**Hebrews 4:15**). The writer shows that believers do not approach a harsh or indifferent judge but a compassionate High Priest who understands every weakness.

3. Let Us Therefore Come Boldly Unto The Throne Of Grace (Hebrews 4:16):

- a. Believers are invited to approach God with boldness, not arrogance, but confidence based on Christ’s intercession (**Hebrews 4:16**). Boldness reflects assurance that God welcomes His children and hears their prayers. This approach is possible only because Christ has opened the way.
- b. The “throne of grace” is a place where mercy and favour are extended, not a throne of judgment for those who trust in Christ (**Hebrews 4:16**). Believers come expecting grace because God has promised it through His Son. The throne once feared becomes a place of help.

- c. The purpose of approaching the throne is to “obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need” (**Hebrews 4:16**). God provides exactly what believers require in every circumstance. Whether seeking forgiveness, strength, comfort, or guidance, grace is given at the moment it is needed most.

Conclusion:


1. Since believers have a great High Priest who has passed into the heavens, they are called to hold fast their confession and trust in His ongoing intercession (**Hebrews 4:14**). This truth strengthens faith and encourages perseverance in the Christian walk.
2. The sympathy of Christ assures believers that they are never alone in their struggles, for their High Priest understands every weakness and offers compassionate support (**Hebrews 4:15**). This comfort invites believers to approach Him with openness and trust.
3. The call to come boldly to the throne of grace offers assurance that God provides mercy and help in every time of need (**Hebrews 4:16**). This promise encourages believers to seek God continually, confident that His grace is sufficient.

Applications:

1. Believers should draw near to God regularly in prayer, remembering that access is granted through Christ’s priestly work (**Hebrews 4:14–16**). Consistent communion strengthens faith and deepens reliance on God.
2. Christians should take comfort in the sympathy of Christ, knowing that their temptations and struggles are understood by One who experienced them yet remained sinless (**Hebrews 4:15**). This awareness fosters honesty and dependence on His strength.
3. The promise of grace in times of need should encourage believers to seek God promptly rather than delaying until circumstances worsen (**Hebrews 4:16**). God invites His people to come with confidence, and timely prayer often brings timely help.
4. Since Christ intercedes continually, believers should resist discouragement and hold fast their confession, trusting that their salvation is secure in Him (**Hebrews 4:14**).

Answer: The question addresses the blessings available in prayer, and the answer is that God promises mercy and grace to help in every time of need, meeting believers with exactly what they require (**Hebrews 4:16**).
