

CULTIVATING A CHRIST-CENTERED MINDSET

Introduction:

1. Scripture Reading:

“Casting down imaginations, and every high thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God, and bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ” (2 Corinthians 10:5).

2. **Explanation:** In this verse, the Apostle Paul addresses the spiritual warfare that Christians must engage in, not just externally but also within their minds. He emphasizes the need to take control of our thoughts and align them with the teachings of Christ. This verse can be broken down into key components that illustrate the depth of Paul's message:

a. “Casting down imaginations”:

- 1) Imaginations here refer to human reasoning and speculations that are contrary to God's truth. This involves rejecting and dismantling false ideologies, arguments, and beliefs that set themselves up against the knowledge of God.
- 2) Application: Christians are called to discern and challenge worldly philosophies, lies, and deceptive thoughts that contradict God's Word. This means being vigilant and proactive in identifying thoughts that lead us away from God's truth.

b. “And every high thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God”:

- 1) High things represent prideful attitudes, intellectual arrogance, and anything that elevates itself above God's wisdom and revelation.
- 2) Application: Christians must humble themselves, recognizing that God's wisdom surpasses human understanding. This involves rejecting pride and submitting to God's sovereignty and supreme knowledge.

c. “Bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ”:

- 1) This phrase emphasizes the importance of not just resisting negative thoughts but actively capturing and redirecting them to align with Christ's teachings.
- 2) Application: This is an ongoing process that requires constant vigilance and intentionality. It involves replacing negative or sinful thoughts with God's truth and submitting every aspect of our thought life to Christ's authority.

3. **Preview of Points:** We will explore how Christians should think:

- a. **Soberly:** With clear-mindedness and self-control, recognizing our limitations and maintaining a humble perspective.
- b. **Beneficially:** In ways that promote good, focusing on thoughts that are constructive, edifying, and aligned with God's purposes.
- c. **Wisely:** With discernment and insight, seeking God's wisdom to guide our decisions and actions.

Summary:

Paul highlights the spiritual battle Christians face within their minds, urging believers to align their thoughts with Christ's teachings. He calls for the rejection of false ideologies (“casting down imaginations”), the humility to subordinate human arrogance to God's wisdom (“every high thing that exalteth itself”), and the active capture and redirection of thoughts to obey Christ (“bringing into captivity every thought”). This passage challenges Christians to be vigilant and intentional in their thought life, discerning and rejecting worldly philosophies and prideful attitudes. We will further explore this by examining how Christians should think soberly, beneficially, and wisely.

Main Body: How ought Christians to think?

1. Think Soberly:

In Romans 12:3, Paul instructs believers to think soberly, cautioning against pride and self-deception. To think soberly means to have a clear, realistic, and humble view of ourselves, others, and our salvation. It requires recognizing our limitations, valuing others above ourselves, and remaining vigilant in our Christian life. Let us explore these aspects in greater detail to understand how we can cultivate a sober mindset in our Christian walk.

“For I say, through the grace given unto me, to every man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think; but to think soberly, according as God hath dealt to every man the measure of faith” (Romans 12:3).



a. About Ourselves:

- 1) 1 Corinthians 8:2: “If any man thinks he knows anything, he knows nothing yet as he ought to know.” This verse reminds us of the limits of our knowledge and the danger of intellectual arrogance. True wisdom comes with the recognition that our understanding is always incomplete and that we must remain humble and teachable.
- 2) Galatians 6:3: “For if anyone thinks he is something, when he is nothing, he deceives himself.” This verse cautions against self-deception and pride. It emphasizes the importance of self-awareness and humility, reminding us that we are not self-sufficient and should not overestimate our own significance or abilities.
- 3) Proverbs 3:7: “Do not be wise in your own eyes; fear the Lord and depart from evil.” This verse advises against self-reliance and intellectual arrogance. It encourages humility by reminding us not to consider ourselves wiser than we truly are. Instead, it emphasizes the fear of the Lord as the foundation of wisdom and calls for a departure from evil, highlighting the importance of aligning our thoughts and actions with God's will rather than relying solely on our own understanding.

b. About Others:

- 1) 2 Corinthians 10:7: “Do you look at things according to the outward appearance? If anyone is confident that he is Christ's, let him again consider this in himself, that just as he is Christ's, even so we are Christ's.” This verse challenges us to look beyond outward appearances and recognize the shared identity we have in Christ. It calls us to acknowledge that all believers belong to Christ, promoting unity and humility rather than judgment based on external factors.
- 2) Philippians 2:3-4: “Let nothing be done through selfish ambition or conceit, but in lowliness of mind let each esteem others better than himself. Let each of you look out not only for his own interests but also for the interests of others.” These verses encourage us to adopt a posture of humility and selflessness in our interactions with others. They call us to value others above ourselves and to consider their needs and interests, fostering a spirit of love and mutual care within the Christian community.

c. About Our Salvation:

- 1) 1 Corinthians 10:12: “Therefore let him who thinks he stands take heed lest he fall.” This verse warns against complacency and overconfidence in our spiritual standing. It reminds us to remain vigilant and humble, recognizing our vulnerability to temptation and the need for continual reliance on God's strength.
- 2) Luke 12:40: “Therefore you also be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.” This verse emphasizes the importance of spiritual preparedness and constant readiness for Christ's return. It calls us to live faithfully and watchfully, understanding that we do not know the timing of His coming.

Thinking soberly calls us to humility and self-awareness. By acknowledging our limitations (1 Corinthians 8:2, Galatians 6:3), valuing others appropriately (2 Corinthians 10:7, Philippians 2:3-4), and maintaining a vigilant stance regarding our salvation (1 Corinthians 10:12, Luke 12:40), we align our thoughts with God's truth. Embracing a sober mindset allows us to grow spiritually, foster unity within the church, and prepare ourselves for Jesus' return.

2. Think Beneficially:

In 1 Corinthians 13:5, Paul teaches that love... thinks no evil. This aligns with the concept of thinking beneficially, where our thoughts and actions are oriented towards promoting good, supporting others, and fostering positive relationships. By focusing on beneficial thinking, we can better utilize opportunities, maintain pure and virtuous thoughts, and build strong, loving relationships that reflect Christ's love and teachings.

“Doth not behave itself unseemly, seeketh not her own, is not easily provoked, thinketh no evil” (1 Corinthians 13:5).

a. About Our Opportunities:

- 1) Acts 26:2: “I think myself happy, King Agrippa, because today I shall answer for myself before you concerning all the things of which I am accused by the Jews.” This verse highlights Paul's positive outlook and gratitude for the opportunity to defend his faith before King Agrippa. It shows the importance of seizing opportunities to testify about our beliefs, even in challenging circumstances.
- 2) Revelation 3:8: “I know your works. See, I have set before you an open door, and no one can shut it; for you have a little strength, have kept My word, and have not denied My name.” This verse emphasizes the opportunities God provides for faithful service and witness. It reassures believers that despite their weaknesses, their faithfulness opens doors for ministry that no one can close.
- 3) 1 Corinthians 16:9: “For a great and effective door has opened to me, and there are many adversaries.” Paul acknowledges the significant opportunities for ministry that come with opposition. This verse encourages believers to persevere in the face of challenges, understanding that adversaries often accompany great opportunities for God's work.

b. In Our Thoughts:

- 1) Philippians 4:8: “Finally, brethren, whatever things are true, whatever things are noble, whatever things are just, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report, if there is any virtue and if there is anything praiseworthy - meditate on these things.” This verse encourages believers to focus on positive and virtuous things. By doing so, Christians can cultivate a mindset that aligns with God's character and promotes spiritual well-being.
- 2) James 2:4: “Have you not shown partiality among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts?” This verse warns against favoritism and judgmental attitudes within the Christian community. It calls believers to examine their thoughts and actions, ensuring they do not harbor prejudice or unjust judgments, which are contrary to God's command to love others impartially.

c. In Our Relationships:

- 1) 1 Corinthians 13:7: “Bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.” This verse describes the all-encompassing nature of love. In our relationships, we are called to be patient, trusting, hopeful, and enduring. Such love fosters strong, supportive connections that reflect Christ's love for us.
- 2) 1 Corinthians 12:25: “That there should be no schism in the body, but that the members should have the same care for one another.” This verse emphasizes unity and mutual care within the Christian community. It highlights the importance of avoiding divisions and ensuring that all members of the body of Christ look out for and support each other equally.
- 3) James 5:16: “Confess your trespasses to one another, and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The effective, fervent prayer of a righteous man avails much.” This verse underscores the power of confession and prayer in building strong relationships. By being open about our faults and praying for each other, we foster a supportive, healing community where God's power is manifested through fervent prayer.

Thinking beneficially encompasses recognizing and seizing opportunities for faith (Acts 26:2; Revelation 3:8; 1 Corinthians 16:9), cultivating positive and virtuous thoughts (Philippians 4:8; James 2:4), and nurturing loving relationships (1 Corinthians 13:7; 1 Corinthians 12:25; James 5:16). By aligning our minds with these principles, we not only enhance our spiritual well-being but also contribute to the unity and strength of the Christian community, embodying the selfless love that Christ exemplified.

3. Think Wisely:

In 1 Peter 4:12, Christians are reminded not to be surprised by the trials they face. This exhortation sets the stage for the importance of thinking wisely. Wisdom is essential in navigating life's challenges and maintaining a Christ-like attitude. As we explore the need for wisdom, we will consider how everyone requires guidance, how our behavior reflects our wisdom, and how a proper understanding of God shapes our lives.

“Beloved, think it not strange concerning the fiery trial which is to try you, as though some strange thing happened unto you” (1 Peter 4:12).

a. Everyone Needs Wisdom:

- 1) James 1:5: “If any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask of God, who gives to all liberally and without reproach, and it will be given to him.” This verse encourages believers to seek wisdom from God, assuring that He generously grants it to those who ask. It highlights God's willingness to provide guidance without criticism or reservation, emphasizing the importance of turning to Him for understanding.
- 2) Luke 2:52: “And Jesus increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and men.” This verse illustrates the balanced growth of Jesus in wisdom, physical development, and social favor. It underscores the importance of pursuing wisdom as part of our overall growth, following Jesus' example of developing a well-rounded, godly character.
- 3) James 3:17: “But the wisdom that is from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality and without hypocrisy.” This verse describes the characteristics of divine wisdom, contrasting it with earthly wisdom. True wisdom from God is pure, peace-loving, considerate, submissive, merciful, fruitful, impartial, and sincere. It serves as a guide for how believers should seek and apply wisdom in their lives.

b. About Our Behavior:

- 1) Colossians 4:5: “Walk in wisdom toward those who are outside, redeeming the time.” This verse encourages believers to act wisely in their interactions with non-believers. By making the most of every opportunity, Christians can demonstrate Christ's love and truth through their behavior, effectively witnessing to those outside the faith.
- 2) Proverbs 2:1-9: “My son, if thou wilt receive my words, and hide my commandments with thee; so that thou incline thine ear unto wisdom, and apply thine heart to understanding; yea, if thou criest after knowledge, and liftest up thy voice for understanding; if thou seekest her as silver, and searchest for her as for hid treasures; then shalt thou understand the fear of Yahweh, and find the knowledge of Elohim. For Yahweh giveth wisdom: out of His mouth cometh knowledge and understanding. He layeth up sound wisdom for the righteous: He is a buckler to them that walk uprightly. He keepeth the paths of judgment, and preserveth the way of His saints. Then shalt thou understand righteousness, and judgment, and equity; yea, every good path” (Proverbs 2:1-9). This passage highlights the importance of diligently seeking wisdom and understanding, emphasizing that wisdom leads to a deeper knowledge of God and righteous living. It assures us that those who earnestly pursue wisdom will gain insight, protection, and guidance from the Lord, who grants wisdom generously.

c. About God:

- 1) Acts 17:29: “Therefore, since we are the offspring of God, we ought not to think that the Divine Nature is like gold or silver or stone, something shaped by art and man’s devising.” This verse reminds us that God, being our Creator, transcends any material representation or human-made idol. It calls believers to recognize the divine nature of God as beyond earthly substances and man-made constructs, encouraging a true and reverent understanding of His majesty.
- 2) 1 Corinthians 1:21: “For since, in the wisdom of God, the world through wisdom did not know God, it pleased God through the foolishness of the message preached to save those who believe.” This verse highlights the paradox of God's wisdom compared to human wisdom. While worldly wisdom fails to comprehend God, He has chosen to reveal Himself and offer salvation through the seemingly foolish message of the Gospel. It underscores the importance of faith and the divine wisdom inherent in God's plan for salvation.

Thinking wisely is a crucial aspect of Christian living, enabling believers to respond appropriately to life's trials and opportunities. By seeking wisdom from God, as James 1:5 encourages, we can grow in understanding and grace, much like Jesus did. Our behavior should reflect this wisdom, as Colossians 4:5 and Proverbs 2:1-9 instruct, guiding us in our interactions with others and deepening our knowledge of God. Ultimately, recognizing the true nature of God, as Acts 17:29 and 1 Corinthians 1:21 highlight, allows us to appreciate the divine wisdom that surpasses human understanding, leading us to live lives that honor Him.

Conclusion:

1. **Thinking Soberly:** Cultivating a Christ-centered mindset begins with thinking soberly, which involves maintaining humility and self-awareness. Recognizing our limitations (1 Corinthians 8:2; Galatians 6:3), valuing others above ourselves (2 Corinthians 10:7; Philippians 2:3-4), and remaining vigilant in our faith (1 Corinthians 10:12; Luke 12:40) helps us develop a realistic and humble perspective. This approach fosters spiritual growth, unity within the church, and preparedness for Christ's return.
2. **Thinking Beneficially:** Beneficial thinking focuses on promoting good, fostering positive thoughts, and building loving relationships. Seizing opportunities to testify and serve (Acts 26:2; Revelation 3:8; 1 Corinthians 16:9), meditating on virtuous and praiseworthy things (Philippians 4:8; James 2:4), and nurturing supportive relationships (1 Corinthians 13:7; 1 Corinthians 12:25; James 5:16) are key aspects of this mindset. By doing so, we align our thoughts and actions with God's purposes, contributing to the well-being and unity of the Christian community.
3. **Thinking Wisely:** Wisdom is essential in navigating life's challenges and maintaining a Christ-like attitude. Seeking wisdom from God (James 1:5; Luke 2:52; James 3:17), acting wisely in our behavior (Colossians 4:5; Proverbs 2:1-9), and understanding God's nature (Acts 17:29; 1 Corinthians 1:21) guide us in making sound decisions and living righteously. Recognizing the divine wisdom that surpasses human understanding allows us to honor God in all aspects of our lives, demonstrating a mindset truly centered on Christ.

Applications:

1. **Developing Humility And Self-awareness:** Apply the lesson of thinking soberly by regularly assessing your thoughts and attitudes. Cultivate humility by recognizing your limitations and the need for ongoing growth in understanding God's truth (1 Corinthians 8:2; Galatians 6:3). Avoid prideful comparisons or judgments of others (2 Corinthians 10:7; Philippians 2:3-4), instead valuing each person as a fellow believer in Christ. This practice promotes unity within the church and a Christ-like perspective in your interactions.
2. **Choosing Beneficial Thoughts And Actions:** Implement the principle of thinking beneficially by consciously meditating on positive and virtuous things (Philippians 4:8; James 2:4). Regularly reflect on how your thoughts align with God's Word and adjust any attitudes or perspectives that do not promote love and unity among believers. Actively seek opportunities to serve and encourage others, recognizing each interaction as a chance to demonstrate Christ's love (Acts 26:2; Revelation 3:8; 1 Corinthians 16:9).
3. **Seeking And Applying Godly Wisdom:** Embrace the importance of thinking wisely by prioritizing the pursuit of divine wisdom through prayer, Scripture study, and seeking counsel from mature believers (James 1:5; Proverbs 2:1-9). Apply this wisdom in your daily decisions and interactions, striving to honor God and reflect His character in all aspects of your life (Colossians 4:5). Understand and appreciate the surpassing wisdom of God's nature (Acts 17:29; 1 Corinthians 1:21), which guides you in navigating challenges and living out your faith effectively.
