

## **The Confidence Of The Christian Life (Hebrews 13:5–6)**

This passage brings together a command, a promise, and a result. The writer calls believers to contentment, grounds that command in the unchanging promise of God’s presence, and shows how that promise produces bold confidence in daily life. In a world driven by fear, uncertainty, and constant desire for more, this text redirects the heart to rest in what God has said and to live with quiet assurance. The Christian life is not meant to be lived in anxiety, but in settled confidence rooted in God Himself.

### **Introduction:**

1. Contentment Is A Struggle For Every Generation. Men naturally desire more, compare themselves with others, and become dissatisfied with what they have (**Ecclesiastes 5:10**). This restless spirit leads to frustration and spiritual weakness. The problem is not new, and Scripture addresses it directly.
2. God’s People Are Called To A Different Mindset. Rather than being driven by desire and fear, believers are called to trust in God’s provision and care (**1 Timothy 6:6–8**). This sets them apart from the world. It establishes a life marked by peace rather than anxiety.
3. True Confidence Comes From Knowing God Is Present. The foundation of the Christian life is not circumstances but the presence of God (**Psalms 46:1**). When this truth is understood, it changes how a person thinks, speaks, and responds to life.

### **1. The Call To Contentment:**

- a. Contentment Is A Command, Not A Suggestion (**Hebrews 13:5**). The writer gives a direct instruction—“be content”—showing that contentment is not optional but required, and it reflects a heart that submits to God’s will rather than resisting His providence.
- b. Contentment Guards Against Covetousness (**Hebrews 13:5**). The warning against the love of money reveals that discontentment often leads to sinful desire, as the heart begins to crave what God has not given instead of being thankful for what He has provided.
- c. Contentment Is Rooted In What We Already Have (**Hebrews 13:5**). The phrase “such things as ye have” teaches that the focus must shift from what is lacking to what is already present, recognising that God’s provision is sufficient for our needs.

### **2. The Promise Of God’s Presence:**

- a. God Personally Speaks This Promise (**Hebrews 13:5**). The words “he hath said” remind us that this assurance comes directly from God, giving it absolute authority and certainty, far above any human encouragement.
- b. God’s Presence Is Constant And Unfailing (**Hebrews 13:5**). The promise “I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee” uses strong, repeated language to emphasise that there is no situation in which God abandons His people, no matter how difficult the circumstances.
- c. God’s Presence Is The Foundation Of Contentment (**Hebrews 13:5**). The reason believers can be content is not because life is easy, but because God is with them, and His presence outweighs every lack and every difficulty.

### **3. The Resulting Confidence In Life:**

- a. Confidence Leads To Bold Speech (**Hebrews 13:6**). The phrase “so that we may boldly say” shows that faith in God’s promise produces outward expression, as believers openly declare their trust in Him.
- b. Confidence Is Centered On God As Our Helper (**Hebrews 13:6**). The statement “The Lord is my helper” shifts the focus from circumstances to God Himself, showing that true security is found in His active support.
- c. Confidence Removes Fear Of Man (**Hebrews 13:6**). The declaration “I will not fear what man shall do unto me” demonstrates that when God is trusted, human threats lose their power, and fear no longer controls the heart.

**Conclusion:**

1. Contentment Flows From Trusting God's Provision (**Hebrews 13:5**). When a believer accepts what God has given, he demonstrates faith in God's wisdom and care, recognising that God knows what is best in every situation.
2. Confidence Rests On God's Unchanging Presence (**Hebrews 13:5-6**). The promise that God will never leave His people provides a foundation that cannot be shaken, even when circumstances change or become difficult.
3. Courage Comes From Focusing On God Rather Than Man (**Hebrews 13:6**). When the Lord is seen as our helper, fear of others diminishes, and the believer is able to stand firm with assurance and peace.

**Applications:**

1. Learn To Be Content With What God Has Given (**Hebrews 13:5**). Instead of constantly looking for more, take time to recognise and appreciate God's provision, allowing gratitude to replace dissatisfaction.
2. Trust In God's Presence In Every Situation (**Psalms 23:4**). Whether in ease or difficulty, remember that God is with you, and His presence provides strength, comfort, and guidance.
3. Speak And Live With Confidence In God (**Hebrews 13:6**). Let your words and actions reflect your trust in the Lord, demonstrating that your confidence is not in circumstances but in Him.

**Summary**

This passage teaches that the Christian life is built upon a simple but powerful progression. God commands contentment, supports that command with the promise of His constant presence, and produces in the believer a bold and fearless confidence. When a person truly believes that God is with him, the restless desire for more is replaced with peace, and fear of others is replaced with courage.

The message is clear: contentment is not found in possessions, confidence is not found in circumstances, and security is not found in people. All three are found in God. When He is trusted, the heart is settled, the voice is strengthened, and the life is steadied.
